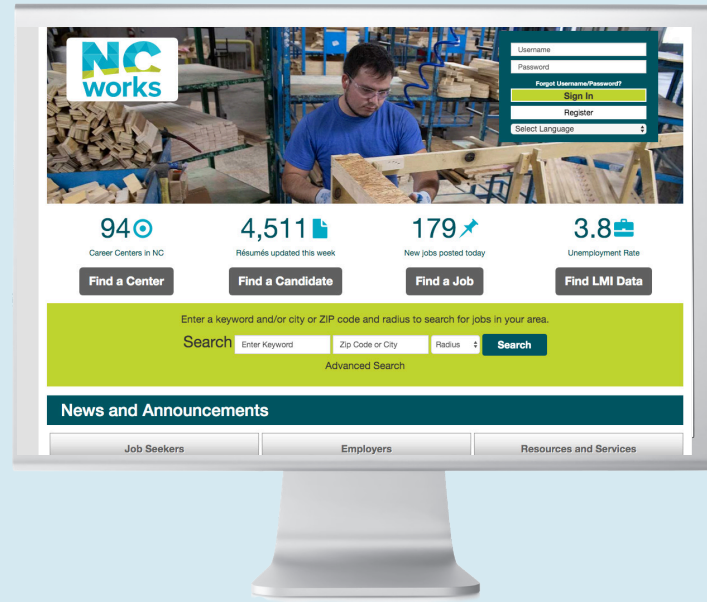


NCWorks Online

VETERAN SERVICES

HELP FOR THOSE WHO NEED IT

Your career advisor can connect you with the services you need to find a job after you leave the military. Through your NCWorks Career Center, you'll receive the following assistance:

- **Assess your current skills and education.**
- **Help planning your next career steps.**
- **Access to training programs or services that can further equip you for the industry of your choice.**
- **Prepare for interviews.**
- **Write resumes and cover letters.**
- **Meet with employers through job fairs and referrals.**
- **Develop a profile on NCWorks Online.**



Career advisors work with veterans with barriers to employment, helping them get the additional help they need to enter the workforce. If you meet one of the following conditions, then ask your career advisor about the services available to you:

- Special disabled or disabled veteran who is entitled to compensation. (Eligible spouses have separate criteria.)
- Homeless or experiencing domestic violence and/or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions.
- Recently separated service member who has been unemployed for at least 27 weeks.
- An offender who is currently incarcerated or who has been released.
- Lacking a high school diploma or equivalent certificate.
- Low income individual.
- Between the ages of 18 and 24.
- Transitioning service members, an activity duty service members being voluntarily or involuntarily separated through a service reduction-in-force.
- A service member who receives a warm handover, or who produces a DD-2958 signed by their commander documenting that they have not met Career Readiness Standards.
- A family caregiver of a wounded, ill, or injured service.

Translating Your Skills

Thanks to your service in the military, you already have skills that employers are looking for. Some veterans struggle to communicate their professional value to employers, because the individual is used to speaking in terms that private businesses don't always understand. Your career advisor can help you translate your skills into easy-to-understand language, so you can show employers your value and set yourself apart from the other applicants.
